

## What types of work do child labourers do?



Asia: A 10-year-old girl stays at home all day to look after the household and watch over her younger nephews while her family works.

Asia: A boy works making handicrafts and trinkets for sale to locals and tourists.






**3.** Africa: An II-year-old boy spends most of the day digging in a small-scale gold mining field.

Eastern Europe: A nine-year-old girl works for several hours every day after school with her family making shoes.

Each shoe takes her 20 minutes to make.

**5.** Eastern Europe: A 13-year-old boy sifts through loose blast rubble to find chromium (used to make stainless steel) to sell. In a day's work, children can find 80-100 kilograms of chromium.

Asia: A young boy stays out late working at a night market selling purses and handbags to locals and tourists.

Asia: A young boy plants saplings in a field. Child labourers can work on either family farms or in commercial farming. Tasks can include: preparing the land; planting seedlings; maintaining the plants, harvesting, and processing crops.

Asia: A young boy searches a city garbage dump for recyclable waste and things to sell, like glass, plastic and metal.

This type of work is sometimes called "rag-picking".

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
